



ALL-IN-ONE

Oftentimes, there isn't enough space to have a separate room for every function. Use these tips to perfect your multifunction room for entering, storing and even laundry.

- CLEAR PURPOSE. Make sure you have clear delineations between each purpose in the single space. Put the sink, washer and dryer together, while the mudroom storage should be in its own separate area.

- **KEEP CLUTTER OUT.** This multipurpose room is primarily functional, so it's easy for clutter and messes to stack up. Keep a clearly designated area for each item that should go here, and if it shouldn't go in this room, don't let it stay here.
- STORAGE, STORAGE. As with any high-use room, storage is key. Closed cabinets, a bench with storage and hanging hooks will all help keep this space organized and fully functional.

The easier it is for your family to put things away, the more likely they are to do so.




If you have more square footage to work with, consider a larger island to create ample workspace as well as extra seating and serving opportunities for hosting.
